School Context

Caversham Valley PS provides education to families and children for most of the suburb of Caversham. Our local intake area for enrolments is bordered by Reid Highway, Bennett Brook, and the Swan River. There is a small optional enrolment area in the western part of Caversham where families can choose between enrolling at Caversham Valley PS or East Beechboro PS.

Since our foundation year, the school has continued to grow, with many houses being built close to the school. Our school serves a very diverse community. A brief snapshot indicates that families come from varied backgrounds with over 60 different countries represented (either parents and/or children born overseas) and in excess of 70 different languages or dialects spoken at home. Many of our students can speak more than one language fluently.

The diverse backgrounds of our students and families is one of the most exciting aspects of our school. The different languages, cultures, religions, and celebrations which brings a richness to learning between home and school.

Predictions for student numbers is difficult, as new houses continue to be built. What is clear is that the growth in housing and student numbers will continue for several more years. With no other primary school planned to be built in the suburb of Caversham, future enrolment numbers of 900 to 1000 students are possible. Since opening, the school has had 12 general transportable classrooms and 2 ECE transportable classrooms installed by the Department of Education. With the building of a double story teaching block commencing in 2023 and due to be completed for the 2025 school year, there shouldn't be further need for transportable classrooms. CVPS should begin to see some of these transportable classrooms being removed from 2025 onwards.

Once the double storey teaching area is completed, Caversham Valley Primary School will be able to permanently cater for 700 students. Additional students over this number will be accommodated in the remaining transportable buildings.

There are many reasons why the suburb of Caversham is attractive to families, including:

- Close proximity to Perth (15km)
- Ease of access to Perth Airport (10km)
- Being on the doorstep of the Swan Valley with all its attractions for children and adults alike
- A safe and open suburb with numerous parks and green spaces.

Our Belief

With further growth in student numbers and the arrival of new staff, a continued focus on our mission, beliefs and values was essential.

2023 was the first year since opening that the school was not affected by any form of restrictions due to the Covid 19 pandemic. This allowed staff to target greater student learning and achievement, as well as strengthening the focus on our school's mission, belief and values.

CVPS staff are to be congratulated for identifying the most pressing educational needs of the students in their care and addressing these thoroughly.

Student Numbers (as at 2023 Semester 2)

School Enrolments

Semester 1, 2023 student census data showed 636 children were officially enrolled at Caversham Valley Primary School. As in previous years, student numbers continued to increase throughout the year. This required the creation of an additional Year 2-3 class for the start of Term 3. The addition of this class enabled CVPS to lower the number of students in all classes from Year 2 to Year 4.

Semester 2, 2023 census data showed 652 children were officially enrolled at Caversham Valley, with a final enrolment of 660 students by the end of the year.

Staffing

The school is driven by a deep belief that every student is capable of successful learning. A high priority is given to building and maintaining positive and caring relationships between staff, students and parents. There is a strong collegial culture of mutual trust and support among teachers and school leaders, and parents are treated as partners in the promotion of student learning and wellbeing.

The school uses recruitment processes to identifying high calibre staff, and to develop a school wide, professional team of teachers with diverse backgrounds, experiences, tenure and specialisation. Recruiting staff with the ability to work collaboratively with our school community and students is a priority that continues.

With the growth of student numbers, besides additional teaching staff, a third Deputy Principal was also employed. Mr David Thewlis joined CVPS from Bolgart PS where he was the Principal for five years.

Western Australia, like all states, is facing difficulty in attracting and maintaining teaching staff. Caversham Valley PS has been fortunate to always identify and employ the required staff.

Student Attendance

Student data shows 'Regular attendance' was 65.5% in Semester 1 and 67.4% in Semester 2. This percentage is below the level we would expect to see at a school that has an ICSEA or family characteristics similar to Caversham Valley PS.

Across all year groups, the attendance rates are generally above 85% in both semesters. This is below the level we would expect to see in a school that has an ICSEA or family characteristics similar to Caversham Valley PS.

At a school such as Caversham Valley PS it would typically be expected that each year group would have an attendance rate above 90%.

Data and conversations with parents indicate that although COVID-19 and associated restrictions were not in place during 2023, parents were more willing to keep their children home if they had a cold or illness. Another significant factor in the attendance percentage being below expected, is that families took the advantage of the borders being open to visit families overseas after not being able to do so for several years.

Our longitudinal data indicates a concern in how parents are notifying the school of a child's absence. Since Semester 2, 2021, the number of Authorised reasons for students being away from school has declined significantly. This is then reflected in the number of unauthorised reasons significantly increasing. An unauthorised absence can occur for several reasons, such as:

- Not informing the school of a vacation during school term in advance,
- Keeping a child home for their birthday,
- Taking a child shopping,
- Any other reason other than the child being sick or on an educational activity.

Parents of children at Caversham Valley PS are very honest with their communication as to why their child is absent from school. Although there has been an increased in 'unauthorized' absences, the percentage of 'unexplained' absences is very low.

It is recognised that a percentage of families do travel overseas during our summer holiday break to visit family and attend cultural and religious ceremonies. Although this may be unavoidable, it is important that other disruptions to school attendance is kept to an absolute minimum throughout the year.

Monitoring of attendance rates will continue to be a priority in 2024 to ensure that the short-term habits we are currently seeing do not become the norm.

Chart 1: Overall Attendance Rate for **CAVERSHAM VALLEY PRIMARY SCHOOL**







Chart 2: Absence Types for **CAVERSHAM VALLEY PRIMARY SCHOOL**





Student Achievement and Progress

The school has a coherent, sequenced plan for curriculum delivery that ensures consistent teaching and learning expectations and a clear reference for monitoring learning across the year levels.

Data analyses considers overall school performance as well as;

- the performances of students from identified priority groups
- evidence of improvement/regression over time
- performances in comparison with similar schools
- in the case of data from standardised tests, measures of growth across the years of school.

In 2023, changes were made to the NAPLAN assessment program and its measurement scale.

These change was made and agreed to by State and Federal governments and schools were notified relatively close to the time the assessments were due to be conducted.

With changes to the scales for the 2023 NAPLAN assessments, CVPS will not be in a position to compare longitudinal data with previous assessments.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN assessments are just one set of data our school uses to judge the performance of our students and school.

These NAPLAN assessments are all one-off tests that are conducted on a single day. Looking at system level analysis the following can be observed on the performance of the 2023 Year 3 and 5 cohorts.



NAPLAN 2023

NAPLAN 2023 was administered through an earlier test window which commenced in Week 7 of Term One as opposed to May in previous years.

The 2023 NAPLAN assessments have been re-scaled and as such, the results for the 2023 are the commencement of a new data time series. This means that no NAPLAN to NAPLAN progress or previous proficiency levels can be reported on until 2025.

The Graphs and tables will now include the four proficiency levels of: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs Additional Support. In 2023 there were 84 Year 3 and 53 Year 5 students participating in NAPLAN assessments at CVPS.

Looking at system level analysis, the following can be observed of the 2023 Year 3 & Year 5 cohorts.

CVPS School Average demonstrated that the Year 3's performed above the WA Public school average in all areas: Writing, Reading, Numeracy, Spelling and Grammar and Punctuation.

CVPS School Average demonstrated that the Year 5 students performed above WA Public School average in Writing, Numeracy and spelling. However, they did not perform as well as the WA Public school average in Reading and Grammar & Punctuation.







Locally Raised Revenue - Budget vs Actual
